Recently, State and National media have reported an increase in positive COVID-19 Cases. The communities of the Copper Corridor have also started to see an increase in positive cases. The new Delta variant of COVID-19 has been reported as highly transmissible. The CDC and other health officials warn that those who are not vaccinated should continue to practice physical distancing, wear masks in public and avoid crowded places and is also strongly recommending everyone wear a mask indoors and in group settings.

Governor Doug Ducey has signed executive orders that prohibit Cities and Towns from mandating mask wearing, limiting restaurant capacity or other enacting other physical distancing requirements. At this time there is no indication that there will be any restrictions put into place. Local schools are also prohibited from requiring masks be worn on campus.

COVID Vaccines are readily available at local clinics in the region including Cobre Valley Clinics in Superior and Kearny, Pinal County Public Health and Sun Life Clinics. Other chain pharmacies such as Walgreens, grocery store pharmacies and CVS also have vaccines available.

We last reported daily COVID-19 case increased on Sept. 27, 2021. Above is a chart showing our last reported number and the current number of total cases for each of the Copper Corridor communities through Oct. 4, 2021. Keep in mind that zip code data also includes unincorporated areas around a community. For instance, Riverside/Kelvin area is included in the Kearny zip code. Aravaipa and Dudleyville are included in the Winkelman zip codes, etc.

Those experiencing COVID-19 symptoms should seek testing and quarantine until they can confirm a negative test.

Working together, we can slow the spread of the virus across the Copper Corridor. Wear a mask in public, remain physically distant (6ft apart or more), practice good hygiene (wash your hands frequently, sanitize high touch areas) and stay home if you are not feeling well.

Resolution Copper Project is at Risk!

Friends, Family and Neighbors, I am contacting you today with great urgency and a simple request: please contact our Senators and Congressmen and ask them to not support the "Save Oak Flat" H.R. 1884 bill that has been proposed by Representative Grijalva and the House Natural Resources Committee. This group of federal elected officials are trying to sneak this devastating legislation into the Reconciliation Bill.

We have learned that Rep. Grijalva and the House Natural Resources Committee have submitted the language for the "Save Oak Flat" into the House of Representatives Reconciliation Bill. The \$3.2 trillion dollar budget reconciliation package will bring tremendous opportunities for communities large and small, urban and rural across America. This bill if passed will need American copper to fulfill its intended benefits. The entire package being proposed in Washington, DC is critically important, and we want our elected officials to support it, but not with the poisoned pills added by the House Natural Resources Committee.

While the nightly headlines often talk of the negotiations taking place between America's political parties in Congress, important details that will impact our lives in negative ways such as the "Save Oak Flat" bill often is unreported.

The addition of the Save Oak Flat Bill if approved will block any mining from the Oak Flat area, and essentially will kill any hope that Resolution Copper Mine will open. There are additional amendments attached to this H.R.

1884 bill that will cripple all of the mining operations in our region.

As residents of Arizona's Copper Corridor, we understand our role in the world. We mine and produce the copper that runs this world. Right now, our role in the global economy is at risk. Please join me and scores of other regional leaders by asking our Arizona Congressional Delegation to remove the Save Oak Flat H.R. 1884 legislation from the Reconciliation Bill. 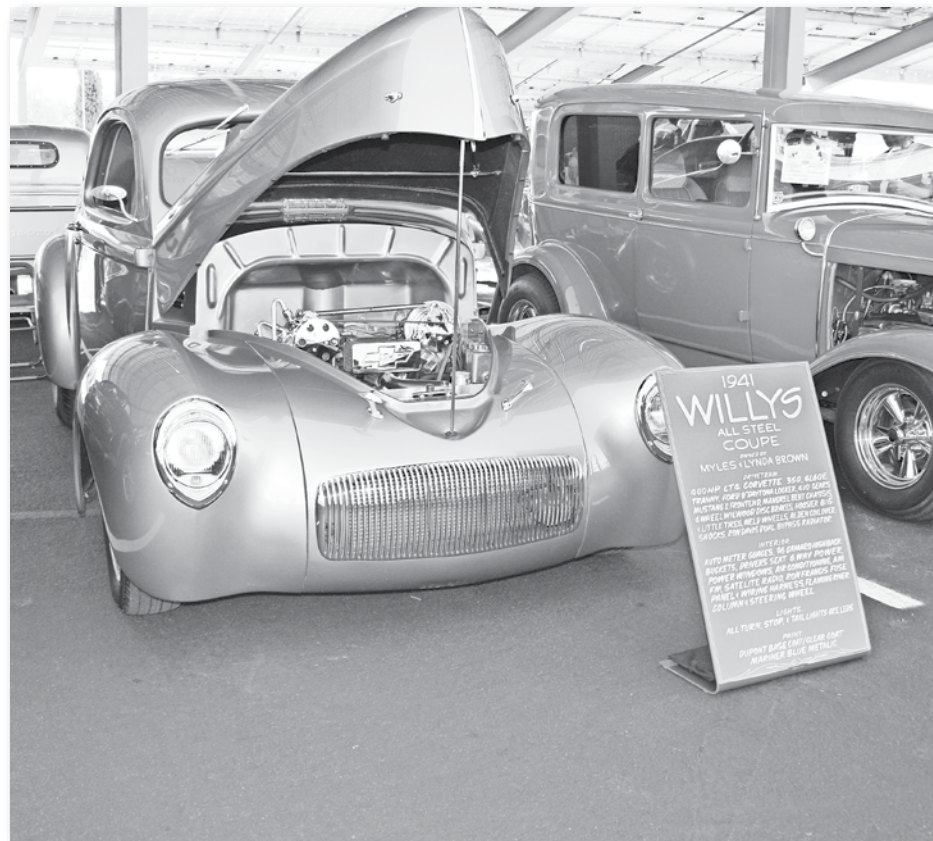
given to each person upon entering their first car. Cars will be under solar canopies.

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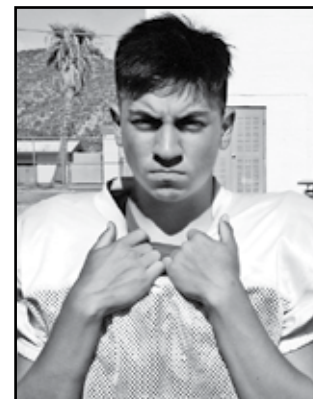

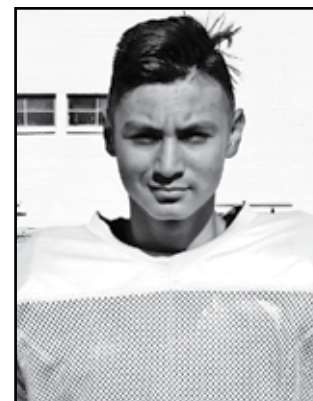

Support Local: Family First Pregnancy Care Center and Family Diaper Bank

In April 2020, COVID-19 brought much of Arizona's economy to a screeching halt. All businesses not deemed "essential" were ordered closed by Arizona's governor Doug Ducey.

The lockdown continued for nearly two months. When Gov. Ducey finally gave the go ahead to reopen, businesses slowly began the road to recovery. Even those listed as "essential" had a challenge with this economic recovery.

Many small businesses and non-profits in Arizona didn't survive the lockdown. The businesses that did survive are hanging on as best they can. *Copper Area News* wanted to give something back to the local business community as a thank you for supporting us through these troubled times. Our newspapers (*Copper Basin News*, *Superior Sun* and *San Manuel Miner*) have been featuring local businesses and non-profits since the beginning of 2021, encouraging our readers to Shop at Home, stay local and support our local businesses. To date, *Copper Area News* has featured 113 businesses and groups in the Copper Corridor.

As the COVID-19 Pandemic took its toll, businesses, families and even local non-profits had to adjust their strategies to keep their missions moving forward while working through the pandemic. Meetings were moved to Zoom and fundraisers had to become creative as in-person events were not allowed.

Family First Pregnancy Care Center and Diaper Bank is a non-profit organization that supports pregnant woman, young families, and teens. They opened in 2007 and have been operation for 17 years. They provide services, programs, and classes for those in need of them.

"Family First is a faith-based organization to provide help, hope, and assistance to those who need it," said the Oracle Center director, Clare Grochocki.

The classes Family First provides include but are not limited to: parenting, life skills, prenatal, toddler, fatherhood, special needs and Bible foundation. Classes like parenting and prenatal are part of a program where you earn credits to purchase items from their store. These items are donated and are gently used or brand new. Family First also provides pregnancy tests and material assistance.

Family First is also a diaper bank. A diaper bank is a place where people can donate and request diapers for those who have poor bladder control such as babies and the disabled. At the diaper bank, you can leave donations of diapers and disposal underwear.

The center hosts a program called 'Ten for Teens'. 'Ten for Teens' is a support group for young teenagers to help prepare teens for the future by keeping them in school, providing a safe space to talk, and providing job training. Teens can volunteer to help give back to their community and be able to be accountable to each other.

The center is open Wednesday and Thursday, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The Winkelman center is located at Fourth and Thorne Streets. You can contact Winkelman Director Nita Kauffman at (520) 664-5795. You can donate online at www.familyfirstpcc.org. Material donations are welcome at the building.

Resolution Copper offsets its operations with renewable energy certificates

The Resolution Copper project purchased enough renewable energy certificates (RECs) to offset 100% of its electrical usage in 2020.

Through an agreement between Rio Tinto Kennecott and Rocky Mountain Power (RMP), Resolution Copper acquired 55,000 megawatt-hours of renewable energy certificates (RECs) from two wind generation plants. The transaction received formal recognition in a final Green-e verification audit report approved by the Center for Resource Solutions (CRS). Resolution Copper has also initiated discussions to purchase additional RECs to cover all its electrical requirements for 2021.

As the project progresses and energy demand increases, Resolution Copper will explore the opportunity to expand such arrangements, including with the Salt River Project (SRP) and its solar plants in Arizona. In 2022, Resolution Copper will complement its RECs by deriving a quarter of its current power requirements directly from SRP's new 100-megawatt solar plant currently being built in Eloy, AZ.

"We're proud to partner with forward-looking companies like Resolution Copper who are dedicated to reducing carbon emissions on a grand scale," said Jonah Roehl, Senior Manager of Key Accounts at SRP. "Our joint sustainability commitments help create a path for a clean energy future in Arizona."

These arrangements and agreements draw Resolution Copper closer to abiding by its net-zero carbon footprint commitment prior to the beginning of the mine's operations. "By supporting clean energy, we will significantly reduce emissions and produce copper while

lowering our carbon footprint. It's just one of the many ways we're working to reduce our overall impact on the environment," said Resolution Copper Project Director
