



Save Rural Arizona Voting Power

very 10 years, mostly ignored by the major media, every voting district of every state in the country is redrawn. A new Census means new population and demographic numbers. These new numbers make us redraw our voting districts. Voting districts must have equal population, not section off groups deemed "minorities" under federal law and realign like communities.

However, there is one minority group in the State of Arizona that is not protected by law, and too often gets trampled on during "redistricting". That minority group is the rural citizens of Arizona. When metropolitan centers like Phoenix and Tucson are excluded, and urban population centers such as Flagstaff, Sedona, Prescott, San Tan Valley, Casa Grande, and Sierra Vista are removed, the rural towns and neighborhoods equal less than 25 percent of the total state population. Our mayors and councilmembers and many of our county supervisors know the struggles of competing against metropolitan areas for a share of the revenues and resources. Besides our local elected officials, there are no laws protecting our people group. We produce the wealth of the world in minerals, crops, and cattle, yet we fight and labor for what we have. We have ourselves. It is up to us to make sure that our rural voice and voting power is returned to our state government.

The Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission is charged with redrawing the district lines for our state legislature. This means, they will decide the territory that we get to choose legislators from in our next elections for another ten years. We get to tell them what we want, though. We get to tell them that Rural Arizona will not be a back seat to Metro Arizona. We require our own voice in the Sate Legislature. Give us our solely rural and undivided legislative district in rural Eastern AZ.

In the Month of November, a public hearing maybe coming to your community. Make every effort to attend and give this message to the commissioners in person. 



The late Tim Kanavel

(PHOENIX – Oct. 28, 2021) – The Arizona Association for Economic Development (AAED) has awarded the William Lampkin Award for Long Term Excellence posthumously to Tim Kanavel, former economic development director for Pinal County. The award was presented at the Economic Development Distinguished by Excellence (EDDE) Award Ceremony held during the organization's annual Fall Forum held in Flagstaff earlier this week.

This award recognizes outstanding achievements by an individual that has made significant contributions to economic development efforts in Arizona and demonstrated a sustained commitment to AAED. Nominations are evaluated based on the overall economic impact of the individual's efforts to Arizona, contributions of the nominee to AAED, the development of strong relationships and community support, and contributions to the economic development profession.

Kanavel was a member of AAED for 20 years, serving on the Board of Directors and chairing the Rural Economic Development Committee. He joined Pinal County in 2009 to create the county's first economic development department.

Kanavel's passion for economic development was evident as he was involved with various economic development initiatives throughout Arizona during his illustrious career. In 2010, he was appointed to the Arizona Governor's Rural Business Advisory Council where he managed a grant budget of more than \$2.5 million in two of the four years there. He also served on the Board of Directors for the Pinal Partnership Economic Development Coalition and Arizona@Work and served as



Kanavel's wife and sons were in attendance. His son, David, accepted the award on behalf of his father.



Recently, State and National media have reported an increase in positive COVID-19 Cases. The communities of the Copper Corridor have also started to see an increase in positive cases. The new Delta variant of COVID-19 has been reported as highly transmissible. The CDC and other health officials warn that those who are not vaccinated should continue to practice physical distancing, wear masks in public and avoid crowded places and is also strongly recommending everyone wear a mask indoors and in group settings.

Governor Doug Ducey has signed executive orders that prohibit Cities and Towns from mandating mask wearing, limiting restaurant capacity or other enacting other physical distancing requirements. At this time there is no indication that there will be any restrictions put into place. Local schools are also prohibited from requiring masks be worn on campus.

COVID Vaccines are readily available at local clinics in the region including Cobre Valley Clinics in Superior and Kearny, Pinal County Public Health and Sun Life Clinics. Other chain pharmacies such as Walgreens, grocery story pharmacies and CVS also have vaccines available.

We last reported daily COVID-19 case increased on Nov. 1, 2021. Above is a chart showing our last reported number and the current number of total cases for each of the Copper Corridor communities through Nov. 8, 2021. Keep in mind that zip code data also includes unincorporated areas around a community. For instance, Riverside/Kelvin area is included in the Kearny zip code. Aravaipa and Dudleyville are included in the Winkelman zip codes, etc.

Those experiencing COVID-19 symptoms should seek testing and quarantine until they can confirm a negative test.

Working together, we can slow the spread of the virus across the Copper Corridor. Wear a mask in public, remain physically distant (6ft apart or more), practice good hygiene (wash your hands frequently, sanitize high touch areas) and stay home if you are not feeling well.

More than a decade added to mine life; US Forest Service approves Pinto Valley Mine Plan of Operations

Pinto Valley Mining Corp. is pleased to announce that it has received final approvals from the US Forest Service (USFS) for plans that will keep the Pinto Valley Mine operating another 19 years. The mine plan of operations, approved by the Tonto National Forest Supervisor Neil Bosworth, allows Pinto Valley to utilize an additional 229 acres of National Forest System lands surrounding the mine.

"This a truly a historic day for Pinto Valley," said Mike Wickersham, General Manager of the mine, "getting to this approval took more than 5 years. We want to thank the Forest Service employees that helped keep this project on track."

Expansion of the mine will maintain 690 jobs and protects the related economic activity, largely in Gila County, for nearly 20 years. "This is a huge win for Globe-Miami and surrounding communities. Both our local businesses and our local workforce have an abundance to gain from this," said Tianna Holder, executive director of the Globe-Miami Chamber of Commerce, "and the cherry on top is seeing two entities that do so much for our community work together to form this agreement."

"As Gila County's second largest private employer, Pinto Valley's continued operation is critical to the region," said Gila County District 2 Supervisor Tim Humphrey, "we can all breathe a sigh of relief knowing the future is so much clearer and brighter."

To get to this decision, the Tonto National Forest looked at all the potential impacts associated with the mine's expanded footprint. Prior to making the approval, the Tonto National Forest solicited input through written and verbal comments from interested stakeholders and evaluated volumes of data provided by Pinto Valley Mining Corp. that was also reviewed by independent technical experts.

The approval charts a course for the continued operation of the mine. The plan includes additional environmental controls and financial assurance that will protect the taxpayers for the company's use of public land. In addition, the mine plan adds extra monitoring and mitigation measures that address potential environmental impacts from the continued operation of the mine.

Expansion of the mine is expected to produce 2.5 billion pounds of copper. Copper is heavily used in industrial, agricultural and energy applications and is a common component of electronics. "With this, Arizona can keep adding to the supply chain and fueling the green economy. There is no green future without copper," said Mignonne Hollis, executive director of the Arizona Regional Economic Development Foundation, a non-profit focused on rural economic development.

About Pinto Valley Mine

Gila County's second largest private employer, the Pinto Valley Mine is in the Globe-Miami mining district in Arizona, one of the oldest and largest copper districts in the country. Copper concentrate production facilities include a primary crusher, secondary and tertiary crushers, six ball mills, copper concentrate and molybdenum flotation circuits, as well as a SX/EW facility that produces copper

All Pinal County citizens are invited to voice their comments regarding housing and community development needs, strategies to meet identified needs, and identifying barriers to those needs. Public input is an essential component of this planning effort. CDBG projects must benefit low to moderate income residents and address one of the national objectives of the CDBG program. Sample projects must provide facilities, infrastructure, housing, and public services. HOME projects must provide housing opportunities for low and moderate income residents. Sample projects include owner-occupied housing rehabilitation, down-payment assistance, and housing development. ESG projects must benefit persons experiencing homelessness or atrisk of homelessness. Sample projects include homelessness prevention and rapid rehousing. Information may be found on our website at www.pinal.gov/grants. For the fiscal year 2022, Pinal County will receive approximately \$2 million in CDBG funding, \$650,000 in HOME funding, and \$150,000 in ESG funding.




