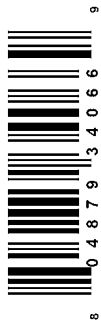


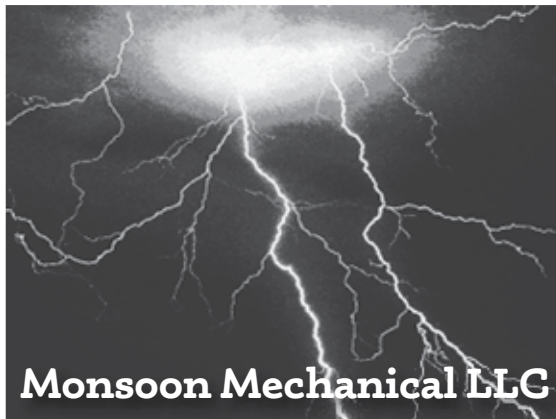

Fourteenth Annual Home & Building Tour set for this weekend

In conjunction with the Home Tour, the Superior Fire Department will host pancake breakfasts for both days at the event.

Forging a vibrant future while retaining its distinct charm as a historic mining town, Superior will soon proudly feature a world-class mine. In this region of Arizona, "copper is king," and will continue to be for many years as more and more uses of this precious commodity are discovered. The Tour will run from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 29, and 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday, Jan. 30.

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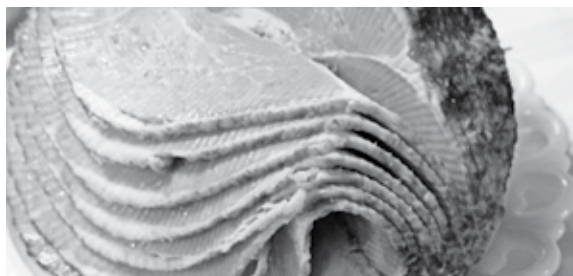
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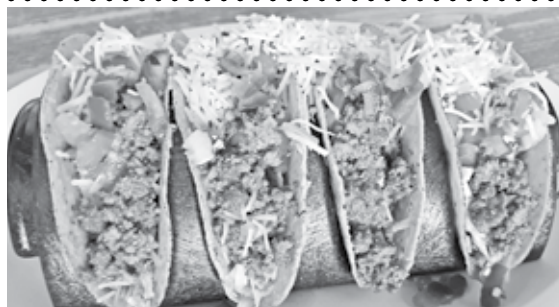

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Mayors, Tribal Leaders say \$18.5 million investment in Stanton's infrastructure authority will help Arizona's water future

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Local Arizona leaders said the \$18.5 million in new investment into an Arizona water authority authored by Rep. Greg Stanton will make a meaningful difference as their communities work to build more sustainable water systems.

Earlier this week, Stanton shared the news that 10 projects would be funded under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law through the Arizona environmental infrastructure authority he secured last Congress. The authority will ultimately provide \$150 million for Arizona water infrastructure projects included in spending plans by U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Pascua Yaqui Chairman Peter Yucupicio said receiving an additional \$578,000 will help the tribe complete a crucial water pipeline they'd started last year. The tribe had received \$900,000 in January 2021 to begin construction of this crucial pipeline, and it was the first project funded under Stanton's infrastructure authority.

"We want to again thank Congressman Stanton for his

tireless efforts to help Tribal communities in Arizona," Yucupicio said. "This infrastructure funding from the U.S. Army Corps for our water line will help us continue to meet the important water needs of our people here on the Pascua Yaqui Reservation."

Yavapai-Apache Nation Chairman Jon Huey said Stanton's work was critical for the tribe to receive \$3 million for construction of a new wastewater treatment system for its Middle Verde District.

"As a result of Congressman Stanton's efforts and his continued advocacy for this program, our Nation was thrilled to hear today that we will receive funding from the Army Corps under this program to help support construction of a long-needed wastewater treatment plant on our Reservation," Huey said. "With this new modern plant, we will eliminate dependence on an outdated lagoon system and finally be able to capture wastewater from both on and off our Reservation and treat it to a high level, producing reclaimed water that will

help conserve the Nation's precious water supplies and provide a foundation for the Nation's future economic development."

Pima County Board of Supervisors Chair Sharon Bronson said the \$2.25 million the county received through Stanton's water authority will be used to install backup generators at its Tres Rios Water Treatment Plant.

"We thank Representative Stanton for his leadership in recognizing the need for the Arizona Environmental Infrastructure program," she said. "Because of his leadership on the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, he was able to sponsor legislation for \$150 million in new authorization EI authority exclusively for Arizona."

Superior Mayor Mila Besich said she was impressed by how quick and diligent Stanton and his team were in helping her town apply for and secure funds for the Queen Creek Restoration Project. The Town of Superior was granted \$2.25 million.

"When Congressman Stanton created the new \$150 million Environmental Infrastructure program for Arizona, he and his staff immediately reached out to our Town to see if we had any needs. He and his staff worked closely with us to identify the Queen Creek Restoration Project. We were very encouraged to learn that he worked diligently with the Army Corps of Engineers to fund this \$2.25 million project that will rehabilitate, reclaim and restore the distressed Queen Creek that is one of our most important community assets," Besich said. "We are grateful for Congressman Stanton's leadership and support."

Flagstaff Mayor Paul Deasy expressed his gratitude for Stanton's efforts to secure two projects for the city: \$1.25 million to construct the WF Killip Elementary School Regional Flood Detention basin in Flagstaff and \$1.2 million to continue construction of the Flagstaff Downtown Flood Lateral Tunnel. Both projects provide post-fire flood protection.

"We are incredibly grateful for Congressman Stanton's foresight and support for the new \$150 million Environmental Infrastructure program in Arizona. We are very thankful that Flagstaff will receive two of the first 10 EI projects in Arizona and we couldn't have done it without Congressman Stanton's determination in fighting for this program," Deasy said. "These two projects will help mitigate environmental damage due to the post-Museum fire flooding and protect an elementary school from routine flooding that often forces it to close. We commend Congressman Stanton for his leadership in creating and advocating for this program."

Maricopa Mayor Christian Price said "since Congressman Stanton was elected to Congress, he has been a tremendous advocate for infrastructure projects" and that the creation of this new authority is yet "another example of his ability to deliver important resources and critical infrastructure to Arizona." Through the authority, Maricopa received \$3.5 million for construction of a new water pipeline.

"We are extremely thankful that we were able to secure one of the first projects under this new authorization,"

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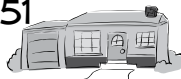

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SUPERIOR AMENDING SUPERIOR ZONING CODE ORDINANCE 17-140, THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCES ARTICLE V, PARAGRAPH 5.4, DENSITY AREA, BUILDING AND YARD REGULATIONS; AS IT RELATES TO SINGLE RESIDENCE DISTRICTS, AND DECLARING AN EFFECTIVE DATE WHEREAS the Town Planning and Zoning Commission has, at its regular meeting held on January 6th 2022, studied and considered Resolution No. 2022-01, a Resolution of the Town of Superior Planning and Zoning Commission recommending that the Town Council approve an ordinance to Amend Zoning requirements for Single Family Residence Districts, to be applied within the Town of Superior, Arizona; and WHEREAS, the Town Council has determined the Amendments to the Town Zoning Ordinance as it relates to Single Family Residence will be beneficial to the quality of life and to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens; and WHEREAS, said Town Zoning Ordinances are in need of substantial revision to meet changed conditions and to conform to existing laws; and WHEREAS a timely and properly noticed public hearing upon Resolution No. 2022-01 was held by the Planning and Zoning Commission during its public hearing on the 6th day of January 2022, at which hearing evidence, oral and documentary, was admitted on behalf of said amendment. WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission of the Town of Superior, in a session assembled on the 6th day of January 2022, approved Resolution No. 2022-01; a Resolution of the Planning and Zoning Commission of the Town of Superior recommending that the Town Council approve an ordinance to Pass and Adopt Changes to Article V, §5.4 of the Town Zoning Ordinances as it relates to Single Family Residence Districts, to be applied within the Town of Superior, Arizona. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN OF SUPERIOR TOWN COUNCIL AS FOLLOWS: SECTION I: Article V, §5.4 of the Superior Town Zoning Ordinances Single Family Residence Districts is hereby amended as follows: Paragraph 5.4 is amended in its entirety by adding modified SR zone in §5.4 and Table No. 1 with notes: §5.4 DENSITY, AREA, BUILDING & YARD REGULATIONS The following chart (Table No. 1) specifies the minimum lot sizes, minimum lot width, maximum building heights, minimum yard setbacks, and distance between buildings. TABLE NO. 1 Single Residence District Zone District; Area (Sq Ft.); Width (Feet); Bldg. Height (Feet); Minimum Yard Setbacks: Front, Side, Street Side, Rear; Lot Depth (Feet); Distance Between Buildings: AR, 196,020, 300, 35, 60, 60, 100, 250, 10a; RR, 87,120, 150, 35, 60, 40,60, 100, 200, 10a; ER, 43,560, 120, 35, 40, 20, 40, 40, 120, 10a; SR, 12,000, 100, 30, 20, 10, 20, 25, 100, 10a; RI-8, 8,000, 80, 30, 20, 5, 15, 25, 100, 10a; RI-5, 5,000, 50, 30, 20, 5, 10, 15, 80, 10a. SECTION II: All other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance or any part of the codes adopted herein by reference and are hereby repealed. SECTION III: If any section, subsection, sentence, phrase, clause or portion of this Ordinance or any part of the codes or regulations adopted herein by reference is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decisions shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof. SECTION IV: The provisions of this Ordinance shall become effective thirty days after the passage of this Ordinance. BLM seeks seasonal call-when-needed firefighters

SAFFORD, Ariz. – The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Gila District is currently recruiting applicants for seasonal call-when-needed wildland firefighters for the 2022 fire season. Wildland firefighters provide a valuable service, protecting American communities and public lands.

To serve on a wildland fire crew, persons must be at least 18 years of age, have a strong work ethic, be able to pass a fitness test and medical exam, maintain good physical fitness, travel out of state for extended periods, and

contribute to a team-structured environment. If selected, the selectee must comply with Executive Order 14043 - Federal employees are required to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

Applications will be accepted through March 18. Applicants will be notified in April regarding their selection for one of the 20 firefighter positions. and can apply the following ways:

• Request, and send forms

back, by email, to the email address provided below.

• Pick up and drop off forms at the Safford Field Office located at 711 S. 14th Ave. The front desk is open to in-person walk-in service — applicants who wish to pick-up or drop-off forms may do so and must comply with posted COVID-19 safety protocols.

While most fire duties will be in southeastern Arizona,

some assignments may be out of state and last 14 consecutive days, plus travel time. Recruits will be classified as Administratively Determined (AD) Emergency Firefighters, hired on a call-when-needed basis, and are only paid during fire and/or work assignments; pay is \$19.72 per hour.

Recruits will receive classroom and field training, and all essential equipment assigned

that will enable them to perform wildfire suppression safely and effectively.

The Air Force announces its intention to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts of optimizing the special use airspace available to support Air Force missions in Arizona.

Proposed Action: The Air Force is proposing regional airspace modifications to alleviate training shortfalls and address evolving training needs for aircrews stationed at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Luke Air Force Base, and Morris Air National Guard Base in Arizona. The Proposed Action includes changing the times of use, modifying the horizontal and vertical dimensions, and adjusting the attributes of existing special use airspace to address training shortfalls caused by insufficient airspace. The modified airspace would support low-altitude training, low-altitude supersonic training, and use of chaff and flares. The Proposed Action does not include any changes at installations in Arizona (personnel, infrastructure, aircraft inventory, or airfield operations), ground disturbance beneath the airspace, or weapons deployment. The airspace proposed for modification is located throughout southern Arizona and a small portion of western New Mexico.

Public Comments: The Air Force is soliciting comments on the potential alternatives to the Proposed Action and information or analyses relevant to the Proposed Action. Comments can be made at public meetings, submitted online at the project website (www.ArizonaRegionalAirspaceEIS.com), or by mailing to: Arizona Regional Airspace EIS, c/o Cardno, 501 Butler Farm Rd., Suite H, Hampton, VA 23666. To ensure full consideration of all comments in preparing the Draft EIS, comments should be submitted by March 4, 2022.

Know when to go to the emergency department for COVID concerns

Many emergency departments are at capacity due to high COVID case counts, staffing challenges and increasing demand for testing. The Omicron variant is extremely contagious and that makes it important for everyone to get vaccinated and know when to go to the emergency

department for COVID concerns, according to the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP).

“Emergency departments in many communities are stretching to their limits,” said Gillian Schmitz, MD, FACEP, president of ACEP. “You can be sure that an

emergency physician is ready to care for anyone who needs immediate medical attention. Whether it’s COVID-related or not, do not ignore the signs of an emergency. But, for those seeking routine COVID tests, it may be more efficient to visit a testing site or take a test at home.”

Emergency physicians

continue to voice concerns about capacity issues and resource constraints. One way to ease the strain on health systems is to recognize when to treat a potential case of COVID-19 at home, and when to seek emergency care. “Fortunately for those who are vaccinated, many of the symptoms that

distinguish the Omicron variant appear to be mild and can be monitored and managed at home,” said Dr. Schmitz.

If you think you have COVID-19 or may have been in close contact with somebody who has the virus, it is time to get tested and contact a primary care physician to discuss treatment options. Emergency physicians report that common symptoms associated with the Omicron variant include head or body aches and similarities with the common cold but may not include loss of sense of taste or smell. Symptoms consistent with COVID-19, regardless of variant, include:

- Fever
- Coughing
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Consider managing mild or moderate symptoms at home, similar to the way a cold or flu is treated, with over-the-counter medication as directed by a primary care physician. If positive for COVID, follow the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines for isolation or quarantine.

Call 911 or go to the emergency department for severe illness, difficulty breathing, intense chest pain, extreme weakness, or disorientation, especially for those at high risk of COVID complications, which includes anyone older or with a weakened immune system.

“The choices we make to stay safe and protect each other can save lives,” said Dr. Schmitz. “Everyone can do their part to slow the spread of the virus and help make sure that emergency departments remain accessible for those who are severely ill with COVID or other emergencies,” said Dr. Schmitz.

Price said. "The \$3.5 million in EI funding from the Army Corps will allow our rapidly growing city to interconnect our water pipeline that will ultimately make it a more efficient and less costly system to operate. We are extremely grateful for Congressman Stanton's leadership on this and other infrastructure issues."

Buckeye Mayor Eric Osborn applauded Stanton for recognizing the "important need" for the environmental infrastructure authority program in Arizona. Buckeye received \$2.25 million to improve its wastewater treatment plant.

"Because of his leadership in securing this \$150 million authorization for Arizona, Buckeye will receive \$2.25 million to protect our \$40 million wastewater treatment facility from potential flooding and degradation," Osborn said. "We thank him for his continued support and advocacy for this program."
