Helen Audrey Reece, 80, passed away April 14, 2023.

Helen led an interesting life. Born in Globe, AZ on Nov. 23, 1942, she and her identical twin, Mildred, were quite well known. This was especially true when they were very young and rather high spirited. Their mother once said; I had to halter and tie them together to maintain any control when

doing my downtown shopping.

After their school years and becoming more disciplined, Helen married Duane Reece. He, with a lifetime ranching and rodeo history, made their home at the Reece Ranch where Dripping Springs wash meets the Gila River between Globe and Winkelman. Their two children were born there, but soon after they moved to another section of the ranch. After the kids became of school age and without bus service, Helen had to drive them to school in Winkelman. To avoid the difficulty of traveling back and forth over a rather rough road, she found a day job in town at the school cafeteria, then as Clerk of the Justice court. The aged J.P. then retired and Helen ran for office. In 1978, Helen was elected for Justice of the Peace and reelected five times. She retired in 1998 after 20 years of service when the court was combined with that in Globe.

As the Election results proved during her time of tenure,

she became quite revered in Southern Gila County. It was just her nature to try doing her very best for the people. Even after retirement, and for years, would receive calls day and night from those who hoped she could help solve their current problems. Husband Duane once threatened to tear the ranch phone line down if she didn't try limiting the calls.

On a lighter note, she often said that performing weddings was her most enjoyable task, and those of a great number! When once asked how many, she said "close to a thousand". Even total strangers throughout the state often sought her out after hearing of her wedding rite style.

Her very favorite, though, were those that she with Duane might require traveling for a distance to perform. They regularly were for those acquainted with Duane and were held on cattle ranches. Although, she never involved herself in a great deal of the actual ranch work, she cooked for "many'a roundup crew" and be well received by all. She often said that those times were about as close to a vacation as they ever had in nearly 60 years of marriage, what with Duane forever concerned with the ranch and cattle.

Helen is survived by husband, Duane; son, Corbet (Gina) Reece; daughter, Kaycee (Mike) Jones; four grandchildren, Austin Stratton, Wheeler Reece, Aisa (Jeremiah) White and Audrey Reece; and soon to be four greatgrandchildren.

Private services will be held at a later date.

He loved his daughter Katherine and enjoyed spending time with his granddaughters, Alexandra and Samantha, who always made him smile whenever they were present.



Beloved teacher, Mrs. Villaverde awarded Esperanza Latino Teacher Award

If you have attended Superior High School over the past 30 years, or maybe your student has attended Superior High School, most likely you have a Mrs. V memory or moment. Carmen Theresa Villaverde aka "Mrs. V" was recently surprised by her students, colleagues, administration and Chicanos Por La Causa as a recipient of the Esperanza Latino Teacher Award.

The nomination form submitted on her behalf shared how Mrs. V is always putting her students first, finding ways to keep them involved in school and the community. The nomination also shared some of the struggles and adversity she has faced throughout her childhood, her career and her family.

She graduated from Superior High School in 1970, and graduated from Arizona State University in 1990 with a degree in education. She then took a job as a Career Education Teacher where she has taught hundreds of students over the last 30 years. She began her career as a Home Economics Teacher and eventually that job has evolved into the Culinary Arts, Child Development and Life Skills teacher. She is an advisor for the Family Career Community Leaders organization at SUSD, while also sponsoring the Senior Class each year making sure that their Senior year activities and graduation go off without any problems. Throughout the community, she is well known for her advisement and work in the culinary department where she assists students to provide catering for many community events.

"At community events she is the teacher everyone cheers the most for," stated Junior-Senior High School Principal William Duarte.

Duarte prepared the nomination and highlighted that Mrs. V has experienced a variety of challenges including having both of her knees replaced and the recent loss of her husband.

"She never stopped caring for her students," he said.

During the surprise ceremony at the Superior Junior-Senior High School, she was awarded a check for \$5,000 from CPLC. The school district also received a donation of \$2,500 for the award.

CPLC recognizes the importance of a quality education and believes it is crucial that everyone has the opportunity of obtaining a solid foundation that an education provides. They believe that teachers are at the forefront of providing this

lasting impact in and out of the classroom. Since 1998, CPLC has recognized hundreds of outstanding teachers and they especially commend the effort they continue making even with the challenges the pandemic brought these past three years.

"For 24 years, Chicanos Por La Causa has honored talented and exceptional teachers throughout Arizona. This year, Theresa Villaverde joins this prestigious roster as a 2023 Esperanza Latino Teacher Award honoree," explained Cathy Higuera Keppel, Director of Events and Special Projects.

"Mrs. V is deserving of this award. During my time in high school she taught me so many important skills, most importantly she taught me a variety of cooking skills, which I still use today. She is the teacher that allows her students to explore and learn and isn't afraid to let students try their ideas," stated Mayor Mila Besich.

The Esperanza Latino Teacher Awards is the only awards program that highlights outstanding Latino educators throughout Arizona. Mrs. V will be recognized during an official luncheon on May 9 in Phoenix.

Nathan Taylor awarded prestigious Flinn Foundation Scholarship

Nathan Taylor, a Senior at Superior High School, has been awarded the prestigious Flinn Foundation Scholarship.

Nathan is the Class of 2023 Salutatorian and has been actively involved in his school and the community since he was in elementary school. He has been a national award contender at FCCLA and is a consistent state award winner at FBLA. He has served in Student Council, Yearbook and has served as the President of the Town of Superior Youth Council since eighth grade. Nathan also helped to coordinate a peer-based program that encouraged his classmates to fill out their FAFSA forms and commit to either higher education, trade school or military service.

He is the son of Patty Ann Taylor and grandson of Patricia Brown.

After graduation, Nathan will attend Arizona State University where he will major in Political Science (Pre Law).

"I am so thankful for the opportunity to be a Flinn Scholar and be able to work with the amazing community at the Flinn Foundation. I am eager to see what the future holds," he said.

The comprehensive scholarship package, which is valued at more than \$130,000, includes the cost of tuition, fees, housing, meals and at least two study-abroad experiences. Nathan is the first Flinn Scholarship recipient from Superior High School.

The Class of 2023 Flinn Scholars will be attending the Honors colleges at Arizona State University, Northern Arizona University and the University of Arizona. The scholarship, now in its 38th year and supported by the Phoenix-based Flinn Foundation in partnership with the universities, is the most competitive and prestigious college scholarship in the state and awarded strictly on merit.

"These 20 students, from 20 different high schools, show that incredibly high-achieving students are found throughout Arizona, studying at a diverse mix of schools in the heart of our largest cities and in some of our smallest communities," said Anne Lassen, Flinn Foundation vice president, scholarship and education initiatives. "These students will enhance the Flinn Scholars community and represent our state well both on and off

The Flinn Scholarship is highly competitive, over 1,000 applications were received in October for the 20 awards, there is a 1.9% of receiving a Flinn Scholarship.

"Our new class of Flinn Scholars represents the best of Arizona and is filled with our state's future thinkers and leaders," said Tammy McLeod, Flinn Foundation president and CEO. "In a few short months, these students will begin world-class undergraduate experiences at our three state universities, whose innovation and excellence in research, teaching, and community engagement strengthen the attraction of this extraordinary scholarship."

The Flinn Scholars Program, established in 1986, is operated by the Flinn Foundation Scholarship Program LLC and supported by the Flinn Foundation, a Phoenix-based private, nonprofit, grantmaking organization that aims to improve the quality of life in Arizona to benefit future generations.
