### Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission seeking public input on new Legislative and Congressional District boundaries; Pinal County event set for July 23

The Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC) invites residents to participate in its first round of statewide public hearings beginning July 23 and continuing through Aug. 9, 2021. Information will be presented both in person and virtually about the redrawing of Arizona's congressional and legislative districts. Public comment received during these meetings will be used by the IRC to help inform the drawing of new district boundaries. Commission Chair Erika Neuberg



urges all Arizonans to attend one of these important hearings to ensure their voices will be heard.

Over the next few months the Commission will be making decisions about Arizonans' future voting districts. Voting districts determine what district a resident will vote in for representation in the United States Congress and the Arizona State Legislature. Redistricting is necessary as it takes into account any population changes from the last ten years and creates districts of equal population.

Arizona voters passed Proposition 106 in the 2000 General Election, amending the Arizona Constitution to create a five-member commission to redraw congressional and legislative district boundaries based upon census data. The IRC is made up of two Democrats, two Republicans and an independent Chair elected by the other commissioners. The chair must not be a member of either party already represented on the Commission. Proposition 106 replaced the old process in which the State Legislature established the districts.

One of the goals of the IRC public hearings is to solicit public input about communities of interest. There are forms available at the public hearings, and or on the IRC website that can be used to define an area that you feel should be considered a community of interest.

# More Arizona communities are leveraging brownfields grants to revitalize blighted properties statewide

More Arizona communities are leveraging brownfields grants to revitalize blighted properties statewide. Brownfields grants help municipalities and nonprofits identify and reduce environmental hazards, mitigate public health threats, create new business opportunities, increase tax revenues and restore impacted properties to beneficial reuse. Each year, communities across the nation compete for limited federal brownfields grant funds. Common brownfields projects involve redeveloping main streets to boost tourism and community services, creating additional greenspaces and adding healthcare facilities. The Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) both administers a state-level Brownfields Assistance

Program to provide brownfields grant funds and helps municipal and nonprofit applicants prepare successful federal grant applications.

ADEQ awarded \$414,000 in brownfields grants in fiscal year 2021 to support these accomplishments:

• The Lowell Observatory (Flagstaff)

assessed and cleaned up existing buildings as they overhaul the site to optimize both their manufacturing functionality and visitor experience.

• Gila County removed lead and asbestos from an abandoned building in Hayden adjacent to a former Brownfields site. Together, the two properties were

**IRC Mission:** The Independent Redistricting Commission's mission is to redraw Arizona's congressional and legislative districts to reflect the results of the most recent census. The concept of one-person, one-vote dictates that districts should be roughly equal in population. Other factors to be considered are the federal Voting Rights Act, district shape, geographical features, respect for communities of interest and potential competitiveness. The state Constitution requires the commissioners – two Republicans, two Democrats and an independent chairperson – to start from scratch rather than redraw existing districts.

A new Arizona Independent Redistricting Commission was appointed in January 2021 to adopt new congressional and legislative districts for Arizona.

"These communities have been tremendous support to us over many years. It is because of the residents of these communities that we have had any success in the last 36 years providing dental health care. We are thankful for the many friendships these communities have provided to us and their many times of assistance," said Dr. Celis. "The children we treated as 4 and 5 year-olds in 1985 are

now in their early 40's and the teenagers are now in their 50's. What a blessing that we have now treated many of their children and grandchildren."

Dr. Celis said that one of the biggest compliments he has received is when a patient told him, "I feel like I am coming to my own home when I come to your office. The way your staff greets me and treats me always comforts me, so I thank you." Dr. Celis is very proud of his staff.

"I feel that the greatest asset any business can have is their staff. The staff here at Teapot has worked together to provide care for the communities. The staff of Family has been responsible for the bulk of all the dental care provided to the Copper Basin over the past 36 years. The staff here at Teapot Mountain have been friends, advisors, counselors and support to one another. Together we have experienced joyous events and harsh difficulties in our lives. No one get along 100% of the time, but I know this: they have helped and comforted each other tremendously over 36 years. There are no words to fully thank them," he said.

"The world and the Copper Basin have undergone an exceedingly difficult and traumatic year and a half. The current situation has personally made us question many things. Many families have undergone trauma and continue to suffer. There have come many dissenting views

### After wildfires, drivers should be wary of potential for storm runoff; ADOT says expect the unexpected, possible highway closures

PHOENIX – This monsoon season could prove to be especially disruptive to travel plans after a series of major wildfires has made burn areas susceptible to flooding. That can leave highways covered with mud and other hazardous debris.

Anytime drivers are traveling this summer, the Arizona Department of Transportation is urging drivers to expect the unexpected, including unscheduled closures, near recent burn areas and to take extra precautions.

ADOT crews are prepared to respond to storms and are already working to minimize flood damage. To promote faster response times, crews are moving heavy equipment from storage yards closer to areas susceptible to damage. Continued on page 9



Also, trucks are being fitted with plows to patrol areas for mud, rocks and boulders or other debris. State highway maintenance crews have been clearing debris to prevent heavy rains from clogging washes or other drainage systems that flow near or under highways.

ADOT's preparation and future responses are being coordinated with other government agencies, including the Arizona Department of Public Safety, emergency management agencies, the National Weather Service, the U.S. Forest Service, fire responders


