

spending hours on the computer making sure those images live on. Joe had a strong connection to his Catholic faith. For many years of retirement, he donated his time and effort to the church. Above all, Joe's most meaningful passion was for his family. Whether it was a weekend or a holiday, he wanted to be at the house of a brother or sister, where he always looked forward to the next game of Trivial Pursuit. Christmas was always about time with family and then mass. His love for his family lives on in those who knew and loved him. Joe was preceded in death by his father, Santiago, his mother, Angela, his brothers Manuel, Chente, Tony, Jimmy, and his sisters Helen, Maria, Carmen, Jenny, and Emmie. Post Telegraph Fire BAER Report Presentation

The Town of Superior and the Legends of Superior Trails Inc. have coordinated a meeting with the Tonto National Forest to provide and update on the Burned Area Emergency Response (BAER) report which was created in response to the Telegraph Fire that burned through the area earlier this summer. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, Aug. 24, 2021 at 6 p.m. in the Media Center at the Superior Town Hall (Former Roosevelt Junior High) located at 199 N. Lobb Ave.

The presentation will be focused on the burned area directly around Superior and towards the Top of the World. The fire burned quickly through the forest south of Superior but did not scorch the ground as bad it was thought to be. This has helped for some vegetation to re-grow and in some areas prevented severe flooding from occurring. The presentation will educate the audience on burn severity and other impacts due to the fire.

Phone and Internet Discounts Available to CenturyLink Customers

The Arizona Corporation Commission designated CenturyLink as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier within its service area for universal service purposes. CenturyLink's basic local service rates for residential voice lines are \$18.47 per month and business services are \$35.00 per month. Specific rates will be provided upon request.

CenturyLink participates in a government benefit program (Lifeline) to make residential telephone or broadband service more affordable to eligible low-income individuals and families. Eligible customers are those that meet eligibility standards as defined by the FCC and state commissions. Residents who live on federally recognized Tribal Lands may qualify for additional Tribal benefits if they participate in certain additional federal eligibility programs. The Lifeline discount is available for only one telephone or broadband service per household, which can be on either wireline or wireless service. Broadband speeds must be 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload or faster to qualify.

A household is defined for the purposes of the Lifeline program as any individual or group of individuals who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. Lifeline service is not transferable, and only eligible consumers may enroll in the program. Consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain Lifeline telephone or broadband service can be punished by fine or imprisonment and can be barred from the program.

From the Pinal County Health Department: Help Prevent Mosquito Related Illness

During seasonal mosquito surveillance the Pinal County Public Health Services District (PCPHSD) has continued to detect West Nile Virus (WNV) positive mosquitoes in the county. Mosquito surveillance is done throughout Pinal County in order to determine the relative risk of mosquitoborne disease to the community. We are currently moving into a higher risk period for transmission of WNV.

Chris Reimus, who manages Pinal County's Environmental Health Division, said, "Mosquitoes are a part of our desert environment, just like the sun. People are used to avoiding sunburns and wearing sunscreen; the same principles apply to mosquitoes. Avoid them and wear CDC recommended repellent if mosquitoes cannot be avoided."

Things that you can do to help stop breeding of disease carrying mosquitoes and prevent mosquito bites:

• Eliminate standing water where mosquitoes can lay their eggs.

- Be sure your property is graded to drain appropriately.
- Change water in flower vases, birdbaths, planters, troughs, and animal watering pans at least twice a week. Be sure to scrub them out when changing water.
- Get rid of junk or debris in your yard that can collect water.
- · Repair leaky pipes and faucets.
- If you have a swimming pool or backyard pond, keep it operational. If you must keep it out of use, make sure you remove the standing water, keep it chlorinated, or run the filter daily.
- Keep mosquitoes outside of your home by having well-fitting screens on both windows and doors.
- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents with one of the active ingredients: DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE), paramenthane- diol (PMD), or 2-undecanone.

• When using sunscreen, always apply the sunscreen before you apply the insect repellent.

West Nile virus is the leading cause of mosquito-borne disease in the continental United States. It is most commonly spread to people by the bite of an infected mosquito. Cases of WNV occur during mosquito season, which starts in the summer and continues through fall. There are no vaccines to prevent or medications to treat WNV in people.

Fortunately, most people infected with WNV do not feel sick. About 1 in 5 people who are infected develop a fever and other symptoms. About 1 out of 150 infected people develop a serious, sometimes fatal, illness. Symptoms of WNV such as rash on the trunk, headaches, high fever, neck stiffness or disorientation, may look like other health conditions. Always seek diagnosis and treatment from a

The Superior Prickly Pear Festival takes place every mid-August in Superior, AZ. Cancelled last year due to COVID-19, this year's festival is back on schedule for this Saturday, Aug. 14, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

This interest originated several years ago when organizers at the Boyce Thompson Arboretum (BTA) - A World Class Botanical Garden located just 3 mi. East of Superior on U.S. 60) began showcasing the many uses and health benefits of prickly pear fruit! ('Tuna')

The harvesting of the bright red cactus fruit takes place in early August when it is fully ripe.

The folks at the BTA had been giving classes and lectures on properly foraging, preparing and enjoying the prickly pear fruit.

Attendance and interest were so overwhelming that the idea of an entire collaborative event with the botanical garden and the town of Superior could be possible.

This was pitched to the Superior Chamber of Commerce and in 2012 we had our first Prickly Pear

prohibited the classes from being held and there were also not many public events to perform at. 
