OBITUARIES Balvina O'Neil

Balvina O'Neil, 101, died on Monday, Aug. 16, 2021, at home, with her family at her side. Mrs. O'Neil was born on Feb. 10, 1920, to her parents Frank and Aurora Cobo, in the mining town of Hayden. Her father worked for Kennecott Copper Corp., and her mother was a homemaker.

Balvina was preceded in death by her husband, Raymond, who passed on in 2003; her parents; brother Frank Jr.; and daughter, JoAnn (Bob) Brady.

She is survived by her daughters, Rose Marie (John) McKee and Beverly (Ron) Sharp; grandchildren, Stephanie (Loren) Dawson, Jeffrey (Sheila) McKee and Jennifer (Jeremy) Bold (née McKee). She is also survived by her great-grandchildren, Lance, Kyle, Samuel and Kaitlyn McKee; Gaven and Faith Dawson; and Madison and Brandon Bold.

She attended Hayden Schools, graduating from Hayden High School in 1938, where she excelled in academics,

softball and tennis. Upon her high school graduation, she attended Arizona State Teacher College (now, Arizona State University), majoring in Elementary Education. Balvina met her husband, Raymond John O'Neil, at a dance and they were married in 1939. They had three daughters. Rose Marie was born to them in Ray. They moved to San Diego where daughters Jo Ann and Beverly were born. During WWII, Raymond went into the U.S. Army, serving in the Pacific Theater. He fought in the islands and was stationed on Okinawa, waiting to go to Japan, when the war ended. When Raymond went to war, Balvina returned to Hayden with their daughters where, after the war, they decided to remain.

Raymond worked at Kennicott and Balvina at the Hayden Post Office, retiring as Postmaster in 1985. She was a member of the Hayden Town Council where she was instrumental in the improvement of the Hayden Golf Course and was a member of the Library Board, where she was delighted to read to young children.

Balvina loved to travel with Raymond, touring Europe, Canada, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Alaska and the Caribbean. They enjoyed traveling through the U.S., especially Texas and California to visit grandchildren. There were family trips to Washington D.C. and New York City, where they attended New



York Yankee games. Every year they went to Florida to see the Yankees in spring training. They were always recognized and greeted by team members and owner George Steinbrenner. In 1993 they moved to Casa Grande to be closer to their children. Services will be private

AFGHANISTAN: A Soldier's Perspective

Anyone who is old enough to remember the events of 9/11 and the vivid imagery and raw emotion that day instilled in our country understands the reason we invaded Afghanistan. We were attacked on our own soil and we were compelled to defend ourselves.

I was in Army basic training at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma when the reports started coming in at around 9 a.m. and the entire base was placed on lockdown. My entire platoon of around 60 people crammed into a tiny room and watched the television mortified at what was going on, as we were helpless to do anything. I was especially

distraught because my sister was living in New York attending art school and worked right down the street from the Twin Towers. For hours, we sat glued to that tiny television saying few words to each other in total disbelief and fear; then finally around 6 p.m., my drill sergeant called me into his office. I was already bracing myself for the terrible news, but all I remember him saying is the words, "Your sister is safe." It was the first time in my life I wept uncontrollable tears of relief, and let me tell you I wept! When I left the office I was embraced by my brothers in arms and felt the love and support every soldier calls camaraderie and fraternity. 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

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



Recently, State and National media have reported an increase in positive COVID-19 Cases. The communities of the Copper Corridor have also started to see an increase in positive cases. The new Delta variant of COVID-19 has been reported as highly transmissible. The CDC and other health officials warn that those who are not vaccinated should continue to practice physical distancing, wear masks in public and avoid crowded places and is also strongly recommending everyone wear a mask indoors and in group settings.

Governor Doug Ducey has signed executive orders that prohibit Cities and Towns from mandating mask wearing, limiting restaurant capacity or other enacting other physical distancing requirements. At this time there is no indication that there will be any restrictions put into place. Local schools are also prohibited from requiring masks be worn on campus.

COVID Vaccines are readily available at local clinics in the region including Cobre Valley Clinics in Superior and Kearny, Pinal County Public Health and Sun Life Clinics. Other chain pharmacies such as Walgreens, grocery story pharmacies and CVS also have vaccines available.

We last reported daily COVID-19 case increased on Aug. 17, 2021. Above is a chart showing our last reported number and the current number of total cases for each of the Copper Corridor communities. Keep in mind that zip code data also includes unincorporated areas around a community. For instance, Riverside/ Kelvin area is included in the Kearny zip code. Aravaipa and Dudleyville are included in the Winkelman zip codes, etc.

Those experiencing COVID-19 symptoms should seek testing and quarantine until they can confirm a negative test.

Working together, we can slow the spread of the virus across the Copper Corridor. Wear a mask in public, remain physically distant (6ft apart or more), practice good hygiene (wash your hands frequently, sanitize high touch areas) and stay home if you are not feeling well.

Local school district votes for mask mandate

Hayden-Winkelman Unified School District voted on Tuesday, Aug. 17, to require all students and staff to wear masks indoors. Superintendent Jeff Gregorich shared with the governing board that 50 students are on mandatory quarantine because of 6 positive student cases within the first 6 days of school.

"There is nothing more we can do now but try to reduce the amount of spread within our schools and community. The new COVID-19 variant spreads quickly and taking away the most effective mitigation strategy right now is nonsensical. Without the use of masks indoors, we do not have a fighting chance to protect our students and staff," added Gregorich.

Governor Ducey has threatened to take away COVIDdedicated federal funding to school districts that fail to adhere with the law he championed that prevents school districts and public entities from issuing mask mandates. The mask mandate restriction was placed onto the budget bill late in June at the last minute to get the approval of several republican holdouts.

"I just don't understand how the Governor can take away money that was devoted to fighting Covid in our schools. It is a bit strange. I know all school districts are trying to stay open and following CDC recommendation seems logical and is based on science not the next election cycle," commented Gregorich.

There are other issues with the mask mandate restriction bill, mainly why was there no debate and why was it placed on a budget bill, especially when it did not have anything to do with the topic. Many feel it warranted a bill and name of its own, considering the importance of the legislation and the public interest during a pandemic. Regardless, the bill passed and now prevents school districts and other public entities from passing mask mandates or risk fines and breaking the law. Hayden-Winkelman Unified School District wasn't the first to pass the mask mandate and won't be the last, as schools are fighting to stay open as the COVID-19 variant rages through Arizona communities.

Gregorich added," I believe that preventing school

districts from implementing mask requirements is dangerous. The wearing of masks are the most effective tool we have to prevent the spread of COVID-19 beyond the vaccination. Unfortunately, many of our students are not eligible yet to be vaccinated. I feel the Governor's mask mandate restriction is reckless and will lead to more students getting COVID and potentially passing it on to others. In our small community, everyone knows someone that has passed away from COVID and many more that have lasting complications due to the virus. I cannot fathom why the legislature and the Governor created a law that would prevent schools from using the most effective tool we have to help keep students safe and schools open to in-person instruction? I thought that is what we all wanted."

The good news for the district came on Aug. 13, when a lawsuit filed that challenged the Governor's restriction on mask mandates by Arizona School Board Association and Arizona Education Association. The Judgment of the courts ruled in favor of the plaintiffs and allowed school districts the ability to temporarily issue mask mandates in their schools until Sept. 29. The judge ruled against the Governor's effort to make the law retroactive and go into effect immediately. The litigators also argued against the mask mandate restriction bill being placed onto a budget bill. The litigators believe the mask mandate restriction deserved public debate and discourse, which did not happen.

Hayden-Winkelman Unified School District President Tommy Lagunas said, "I am not a medical expert, but my decision to vote to implement a mask mandate is based on the science and the medical experts. When the CDC and all public health experts and medical associations recommend the wearing of masks for students in schools, maybe we should listen to them, not the politicians. My recommendation and vote to implement mask mandates is about common sense and keeping our children safe. The way I see it is, the Governor's threat to school districts is unfortunate, political and risks the safety of our students, staff, and community."

n April 2020, COVID-19 brought much of Arizona's economy to a screeching halt. All businesses not deemed "essential" were ordered closed by Arizona's governor Doug Ducey.

The lockdown continued for nearly two months. When Gov. Ducey finally gave the go ahead to reopen, businesses slowly began the road to recovery. Even those listed as "essential" had a challenge with this economic recovery.

Many small businesses and non-profits in Arizona didn't survive the lockdown. The businesses that did survive are hanging on as best they can. Copper Area News wanted to give something back to the local business community as a thank you for supporting us through these troubled times. Our newspapers (Copper Basin News, Superior Sun and San Manuel Miner) have been featuring local businesses and non-profits since the beginning of 2021, encouraging our readers to Shop at Home, stay local and support our local businesses. To date, Copper Area News has featured 98 businesses and groups in the Copper Corridor.

As the COVID-19 Pandemic took its toll, businesses, families and even local nonprofits had to adjust their strategies to keep their missions moving forward while working through the pandemic. Meetings were moved to Zoom and fundraisers had to become creative as in-person events were not allowed.

The Ray Bearcats Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO) was founded in February 2019 by a group of like-minded parents. The purpose of the PTO, according to their bylaws, is to 'enhance the educational experience for students, staff, and families residing in the district of Ray Unified School No. 3. This includes homeschooled students and their families within the district'.

"We recently added homeschooled children and families to our bylaws to include them as we have seen an influx of homeschooled children in our area in the past year," explained Melissa Day, one of the founders and recording secretary.

The organization was built separate from the school so as to ensure any restrictions made by the school would not affect the PTO's ability to provide incentives, events and extra activities within the community. The community and students saw this first hand at the group's Field Day back in May of this year.

"Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the school was not allowing visitors on property at that time, so we were happy to be able to do the event somewhere else," said Day. "From the positive feedback we received, we believe the students and families were also happy."

The Ray Bearcats PTO is going into its third year of business. In the first year, they successfully received their tax exempt status as a federally recognized 501(c)3 organization.

"This is a huge deal as this helps us receive more donations for events and such because

businesses can actually get 100% of that donation back come tax season. Pretty cool!" Day exclaimed. "One of our very first large donations were four brand new water fountains to install in the schools. We also received many cash donations from local businesses to help with startup costs. Thank you to everyone who has ever donated to the Ray Bearcats PTO!"

The PTO has organized itself to be successful but at the same time keep volunteers from getting burnt out. Volunteering can be so rewarding, Day explained, but when the same people are doing everything, it can start to feel like an unpaid job. "This is why the PTO welcomes 'Committee Leaders' to lead a specific event/incentive that we provide. If you have an idea, we welcome you to run with it by leading it!" Day added. "For example, we have a leader for each event. Bulletin Boards are created by our one and only Christine Herring. She is the leader and she gets together with her helpers and they decorate the bulletin boards in the school to add color and something different every quarter. We also have a leader for one of our fundraisers called Read-A-Thon. Jannae Yslas-Roach invites members to join her in planning, and executing the fundraiser to be successful. All events require helpers in the committee, so join one today!"

The Ray Bearcats PTO business side is run by its Board Members. These include positions of President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, and Teacher Representatives. Being a nonprofit organization takes a lot of work! but that is mine. Twenty years later we were still fighting a war in Afghanistan, not to root out those responsible for the attacks of 9/11 but to help create a nation which we hoped would be founded on the principles of freedom and democracy. Not an easy task in a region with such a tumultuous historical, ideological, and religious background; and only now can we see it was an impossible one. Britain and Russia both tried the invasion method to sway Afghanistan into becoming something it fundamentally is not, each met with similar failures and withdrew. To my brothers and sisters who served in Afghanistan, some of

whom left pieces of themselves on those far flung battlefields and others who left actual parts of themselves, I say to you: you are the reason the people of that war-torn country enjoyed two decades of relative peace and prosperity. You were the Soldiers, Marines, Airmen and women. and Sailors who stood between religious zealots who sought to overtake and subjugate the good people of that nation. Your strength, courage, and tenacity in the face of suicide bombers, coordinated ambushes, and loss of brothers and sisters whom you loved are to be respected and applauded. Although I am sure these words do little to quell the righteous indignation you must feel at this point, please know that the honor you have bestowed upon your communities, your family, and country can never be taken from you. 
