

Cavanaugh Offers Explanation for Vote

n Wednesday, the Pinal County Board of Supervisors rejected over \$3.3 million dollars from the federal government. The \$3.3 million dollars would have required Pinal County to create a Vaccine Equity Coordinator who would be in charge of federal communications regarding public health.

After reading the fine print, I decided that it was best to reject the federal dollars for a number of reasons, most importantly being that the federal dollars specifically forbid ANY money from being spent on actual vaccines!

OT21-2103 funds cannot be used for purchasing or providing vaccines. Recipients are advised to use other existing funding sources intended for those purposes. (https://www.cdc.gov/publichealthgateway/docs/partnerships/OT21-2103-Recipient-Orientation-QandA.pdf)

So, if the funding cannot be used for actual vaccines, then what is the money for? According to the CDC, "Increase/improve data collection and reporting for populations experiencing a disproportionate burden of COVID-19 infection, severe illness, and death to guide the response to the COVID-19 pandemic."

In other words, the CDC is using your money to hire data collectors and analysis to track you and report your health information to Washington. Interestingly enough, Pinal County already has these capabilities and our Public Health Office has a website that is updated every other day with the latest COVID-19 statistics. https://www.pinalcountyaz.gov/publichealth/CoronaVirus/Pages/Home.aspx.

The citizens of Pinal County should have the choice about providing their data to the federal government.

A DECISION BETWEEN YOU AND YOUR DOCTOR

Medical care is personal, and ALL medical decisions should be made between you and your doctor. You are a person, not a policy. Too often lawmakers in Washington think of Americans as tools to be manipulated for policy ends. Instead of creating more freedom for Americans, politicians, limit freedom through one-size-fits-all policy.

The federal dollars would not have improved medical

care, the dollars were essentially directed at creating a Vaccine Czar in Pinal County.

Item 5. Requirements.

The Intergovernmental Agreement requires, "The activities in this Contract shall be performed...for the purpose of increasing immunization coverage levels of children...and adults...in both public and private sectors of health care." The way the grant attempts to increase immunization levels is through a marketing plan, with cash giveaways and other incentives.

Missing from all of this is a medical doctor's opinion that the vaccine is necessary for you. Immunizations may be good for most but not for all. What if a person has cancer or other ailment which prevents them from receiving the vaccine? According to the NIH:

Patients with blood-related cancers often have dysfunctional immune systems, and as a result they're just not able to respond as well to the COVID-19 vaccine as other people," said Elad Sharon, M.D., M.P.H., a senior investigator at NCI, who was not involved in the new studies but is leading a clinical trial testing COVID-19 vaccines in people being treated for cancer.

Now the federal government is creating vaccine mandates for all. Federal employees will take the place of your doctor and tell you what medicine to receive or not receive. Of course, these decisions won't be based upon your individual medical needs but the needs of equity and one-size-fits-all policy. Like most of these rules, they will apply to you and your family, not to elite politicians, or apparently to Federal Postal Workers.

From the time the vaccines were made available, I spent hours on the phone with the Public Health Director making sure that communities in District One had access to them and my staff in the Mammoth Office facilitated scheduling as people became increasingly frustrated with busy signals and hours on hold with the "Central Appointment Desk." Vaccines should be made readily available to those who want them.

Chairman Offers Apology for Vote

n Sept. 1, 2021, the Pinal County Board of Supervisors acting as the board of directors for the Public Health District meeting turned down 3.2 million dollars of federal grant money to help the county with the COVID-19 pandemic. In my opinion, this decision was shocking and disappointing. I'm

The purpose of the grant was to ensure greater accessibility of COVID-19 vaccines throughout the public health district, now and in the future. Why my colleagues could not see the benefits to our constituents would need to be asked of them. I believe the decision to turn down the agenda item for the grant revolved around two things, misleading information from a fellow supervisor, and the term

To begin, during the Sept. 1 Board of Supervisors meeting, it was mentioned that 320,800 of our constituents have been vaccinated. This misleading information was presented in the public meeting and also placed on a public blog by Pinal County

Supervisor Kevin Cavanaugh, District 1. This deceptive statement was intentional to create a false perception to show that majority of Pinal County residents have been fully vaccinated; however, that is the furthest from the truth.

The 320,800 number presented by Supervisor Cavanaugh was reflective of the amount of vaccines administered, not the total of people fully vaccinated. According to the Arizona Department of Health and Human Services, only 165,160 citizens in Pinal County are fully vaccinated. I am not sure why a Supervisor's office with a staff of five does not understand the concept that the major vaccines Pinal County distributed requires two doses to be considered fully vaccinated.

The second issue that appeared in the discussion was the word "equity". This word has created strife in this country and in everyday dialogue. Equity is a word I do not fully understand as it is commonly viewed with multiple interpretations.

I was taught the meaning of equity as a term of "net worth" described in economics and accounting as, assets, minus liabilities, equals equity. I also view equity as the measure of value in relationships built. After my research, equity in my perspective as it relates to this issue is fairness, which I would define as "equality".

The word "equity" has become a divisive word that has inflicted animosity among our country and county. Ultimately, I believe it was the driving force as to why the grant was denied. Had a different word been used to identify the role, I firmly believe the agenda item would have passed.

As an elected official, I am given the charge to represent my constituents, not to impose my personal beliefs or philosophy that would impede on a worthy opportunity for the people I represent. I will make it a priority to secure the finances needed to ensure our residents get the vaccine, no matter their location or socio- economic status. Opportunity is the one thing that our country will grant you, and I will fight to ensure each citizen in our county has the opportunity to get vaccinated.

In the future, let's hope my colleagues

I would also like to respond to Pete Rios' Letter to the Editor published on Sept. 8, 2021. As many of you know Pete was the Supervisor from District 1, who was never a qualified elector of District 1 in accordance with State Law. He claimed to live in Dudleyville by maintaining an empty residence when in fact he always lived in Apache Junction, which is District 2. His residence is in Apache Junction, he sent his children to school in Apache Junction, and received his mail there. Arizona Law requires that a Board of Supervisor, "shall be qualified electors of their supervisory district." A.R.S. § 11-211(A).

The purpose of this rule is so the people will elect someone from their own community, knows the local issues, and literally lives with their political decisions. For 12 years Pete mismanaged and underserved our communities, raised tax rates to the highest levels allowable

by law, and developed a bad reputation among his constituents, which is no doubt why the voters rejected him. My office is actually managing issues and serving our communities, and in my first eight months have successfully reduced the property tax rate. I helped bring jobs to San Manuel, and continue to work toward bringing a grocery store to San Manuel.

This week we are announcing a fiber network of over 320 miles of high-capacity internet cable to schools and libraries and to homes throughout the Copper Corridor. This is an almost 9-million-dollar project which will supply high speed internet throughout Superior, Kearny, Dudleyville, Mammoth, San Manuel, and Oracle. This was a campaign promise that I delivered on in only eight months on the job because we made it a priority! Pete, on the other hand, had no notable accomplishments aside from a high-speed chase from a Sheriff's

My office has also demanded more accountability and policing throughout the Copper Corridor. At the Board of Supervisor's Meeting a little more than a week ago, I not only asked that salaries of Sheriff's Deputies be raised more than requested by our Sheriff, but I also asked our county manager if this money could be tied to keeping more deputies in the Copper Corridor. I demand action and accountability from my office and all county officers. Pete on the other hand accomplished little in twelve years, much less than I have accomplished in eight months.

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


Coach Denhalter cited mental miscues as

Resolution Copper offsets its operations with renewable energy certificates

The Resolution Copper project purchased enough renewable energy certificates (RECs) to offset 100% of its electrical usage in 2020.

Through an agreement between Rio Tinto Kennecott and Rocky Mountain Power (RMP), Resolution Copper acquired 55,000 megawatt-hours of renewable energy certificates (RECs) from two wind generation plants. The transaction received formal recognition in a final Green-e verification audit report approved by the Center for Resource Solutions (CRS). Resolution Copper has also initiated discussions to purchase additional RECs to cover all its electrical requirements for 2021.

As the project progresses and energy demand increases, Resolution Copper will explore the opportunity to expand such arrangements, including with the Salt River Project (SRP) and its solar plants in Arizona. In 2022, Resolution Copper will complement its RECs by deriving a quarter of its current power requirements directly from SRP's new 100-megawatt solar plant currently being built in Eloy, AZ.

"We're proud to partner with forward-looking companies like Resolution Copper who are dedicated to reducing carbon emissions on a grand scale," said Jonah Roehl, Senior Manager of Key Accounts at SRP. "Our joint sustainability commitments help create a path for a clean energy future in Arizona."

These arrangements and agreements draw Resolution Copper closer to abiding by its net-zero carbon footprint commitment prior to the beginning of the mine's operations. "By supporting clean energy, we will significantly reduce emissions and produce copper while lowering our carbon footprint. It's just one of the many ways we're working to reduce our overall impact on the environment," said Resolution Copper Project Director Andrew Lye.

As a future copper producer, Resolution Copper recognizes its role in providing the building blocks for America's clean energy future. Copper itself is essential to build clean energy technology, including wind turbines, solar panels, transmission lines, energy storage systems and electric vehicles.

Until the mine reaches netzero carbon emissions, Resolution Copper is committed to continue seeking carbon neutral pathways to offset its energy consumption.

the pandemic hit; they were some of the first businesses locked down by the government and were allowed to open only after many other businesses had done so. They were forced to modify their procedures, limiting much of their close up work like bang and beard trims.

Irene Morris grew up in Compton, California. Her parents were the owners of a neighborhood grocery store. She grew up with her five brothers and four sisters. They grew up understanding the challenges of the life of business owners. Her parents encouraged her after high school to become a beautician and open her own beauty salon above the their grocery store. At first, she didn't think it would work, but before she knew it she had a steady clientele and she enjoyed helping people with their hair care needs.

"I found out later that my parents would tell their customers, you need a haircut, go see you our daughter upstairs," she said.

She has been doing hair through a variety of hair trends and styles. She said her favorite hair styles to do were the Farrah Fawcett styles, the blond highlights and natural waves. She also enjoys helping people change their hair styles and colors as life changes.

In her interview, she explained that the life in Compton, California is very much real to life as you see on television. Sirens, violence and drug abuse – she remembers having clients who lost their children due to drugs. This way of life was taxing on her and her husband. Her sister Mary and her husband Charlie had recently moved from California to Superior and once she saw the quiet peaceful town of Superior, she decided it was time for them for them to move.

During her first year in Superior, she worked in another salon, thinking that she didn't want to re-open another independent salon. But eventually she determined that she wanted to open her own shop in Superior.

"I've determined why people live so long in Superior," she explained, "They do not have to deal with the stress of the city life. It is quiet and peaceful here."

She has enjoyed getting to know the people of Superior, new residents and long time residents.

"I have customers who I have been doing their hair since they were in high school, and now I am doing their children's hair," she said.

Irene is not one to not be busy, and during the pandemic she followed all the rules that were required. But during the time of closure, she and her husband painted and deep cleaned the salon. She was ready to re-open as soon as she could.


